- DEC 10-Schools closed again
- JAN 9-Schools begin opening again

Health Official: Dr. Luther Milton Powers, City Health Commissioner

Masks: Recommended not mandated. *US Surgeon General Rupert Blue asked Powers to NOT issue mask mandate orders.

Military Connections: Naval Reserve Station @ LA Harbor, Army Arcadia Balloon School

Primary Strategies: Social distancing with bans and closures initially then it was quarantines and masking because they did not want to stress the public with more general closures.

School Closures: Yes. (OCT 11-DEC 2 then again from DEC 10-JAN 6 through FEB 6). *Correspondence instruction was arranged for the 90,000 children in the LA public school system.
