

WHOLE CITY PAYS TRIBUTE TO PEIXOTTO

Unexpected Death of Ardent Boy Welfare Worker, Grieves All Circles

Funeral services for Major Sidney S. Peixotto, founder of the Columbia Park Boys' Club and known throughout the city, State and Nation for his activities in boy welfare work, will be held tomorrow morning at 10 o'clock at the Columbia Park Boys' Club, 458 Guerrero street. The body will lie in state at the clubhouse today and friends will be permitted to view the remains.

Major Peixotto was found dead Sunday morning at the Boys' Club camp near Piercy in Mendocino county, 100 miles south of Eureka. Physicians said that he had passed away some time during the night and ascribed his death to apoplexy. The body will be brought to San Francisco from Ukiah early this morning.

The funeral oration tomorrow will be delivered by Rabbi Louis I. Newman and interment will be made at San Mateo. The Columbia Park Boys' Band will play a funeral dirge and member of the club will form a guard of honor. There will be escorts from the Police Department, Fire Department and the Boy Scouts.

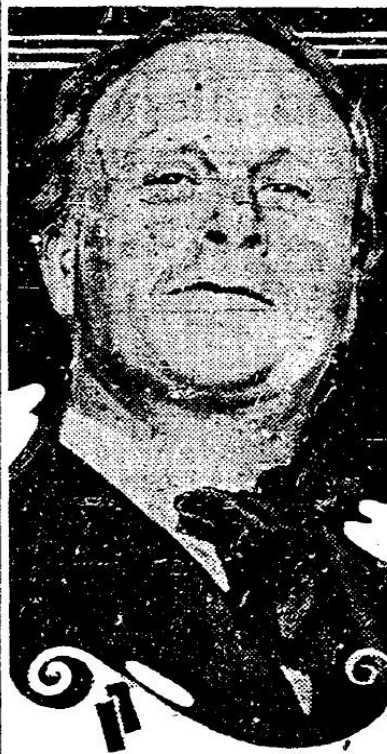
Major Peixotto was born in New York in 1866 and was brought to San Francisco when he was 2 years old. He grew up in this city and in 1895 he founded the Columbia Park Boys' Club. He achieved remarkable success with this organization, taking the boys on tours of the United States, Mexico, Canada and the Antipodes, and in 1913-14 he led the boys on their celebrated tour around the world, a fourteen-month trip.

MUCH WELFARE WORK

In addition to his work with the Columbia Park organization Major Peixotto was identified with many other boy welfare projects. He was a charter member of the Associated Boys' Council formed by the various service clubs of the city, and he founded the Public Schools Athletic League in 1908. He was a member of the first Playground Commission that San Francisco ever had and from 1907 to 1909 he was president of the Pacific Athletic Association of the American Amateur Athletic Union. He was commissioned a Major in the California National Guard in 1903.

widow, his mother, two brothers and a sister. His widow, Mrs. Jean Small Peixotto, whom he married on January 31 of this year, is living at 458 Guerrero street. Mrs. Myrtille Peixotto, his mother, lives in Berkeley with his sister, Dr. Jessica Peixotto, who is professor of social economics at the University of California.

BROTHER AN ARTIST

His brother, Ernest C. Peixotto, living in San Francisco, is an author and painter known to fame in both America and Europe, and a younger brother, Eustace M. Peixotto, is a Captain in the United States regular army. Major Peixotto was a brother of the late Edgar D. Peixotto, San Francisco attorney, who died last June. Major Peixotto was married in 1921 to Miss Phyllis Frankel of Brisbane, Australia, from whom he was divorced two years later.

Tribute to the memory of Major Peixotto was paid yesterday in official resolutions drawn up by the Associated Boys' Council of the various service clubs of the city. The executive board of the council plans to attend the funeral in a body tomorrow morning.
